- 3. Why does Luke note that Mary, "treasured all these things, pondering them in her heart" (v. 19)? What are we, as readers, to glean from this (see also v. 12)?
- 4. Why does Luke situate Jesus' birth in the context of Roman history (2:1-3)? How does Caesar unknowingly advance God's plan (see 2:1; Micah 5:1-2)? How would people in the broader Roman world have heard terms like "Savior" (v. 11) "Lord" (v. 11) and "good news of a great joy...for all the people" (v. 10)? What point is Luke making about Jesus, and his Lordship?
- 5. Where is Jesus' born (v. 7)? Why is this detail significant?
- 6. Why is it significant that shepherds are the first to hear of Christ's birth (Luke 2:8-14)? How does this event fulfill Mary's words in Luke 1:52?
