Winning the Hearts of Daughters and Sons (Psalm 23:26)

Prov 23:26 (NASB) $- {}^{26}$ My son, give me your heart, and let your eyes observe my ways.

Main Point: Discipleship of the next generation also involves winning the hearts of the daughters and sons to ourselves, so that what is passed-down is received.

Ps 78:1-7 (NASB) – ¹ Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth! ² I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings from of old, ³ things that we have heard and known, that our fathers have told us. ⁴ We will not hide them from their children, but tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and His might, and the wonders that He has done. ⁵ He established a testimony in Jacob and appointed a law in Israel, which He commanded our fathers to teach to their children, ⁶ that the next generation might know them, the children yet unborn, and arise and tell them to their children, ⁷ **so** *that they should set their hope in God* and not forget the works of God, but keep His commandments.

Deut 6:6-7 (NASB) – ⁶ These words, which I am commanding you today, shall be on your heart. ⁷ You shall teach them diligently to your sons and shall talk of them when you sit in your house and when you walk in the way and when you lie down and when you rise up.

Matt 11:28-29 (NASB) – ²⁸ Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.
